Purpose: To develop organisational research into quality improvement and support doctoral and other researchers studying quality and safety in health care.

Objectives: Create a forum for researchers carrying out research into quality improvement to:

- better link their research to already published research in the subject,
- improve their research methods,
- form contacts with colleagues working in similar fields for later exchanges

Format

Before the meeting researchers send their presentations to their discussant and other colleagues attending the event (this is required for participation).

Selected researchers present their research proposals or completed parts of the research for 18 minutes, with 3 questions which they would like colleagues to help with.

Discussant presents constructive crucial comments for improvements and questions.

15 minutes discussion (with time during breaks to give more informal comments)

Guest expert researcher speaker to present a short paper on research methods and theories in this area.





There are no hotels close to the venue, Rigshospitalet. But there are buses and some are within reasonable walking distance, even along the tree lined "lakes".


In the map below Rigshospitalet is the RED Square in the map below, and hotels are the green dots.
